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HSF CHANGES TO ACCU-CHEK GUIDE METER

HSF currently covers the Accu-Chek Aviva+ glucometer, which is dispensed through clinic. Roche has discontinued the Accu-Chek Aviva+ glucometer, but they will continue to manufacture the test strips for existing patients who still have Aviva+ meters. Now that the Aviva+ meter has been discontinued, Healthy San Francisco will be covering the Accu-Chek Guide as of May 3, 2021. The Guide has several features that the Aviva+ does not provide (our favorite features are the ability to program the Guide meter in different languages, and the ability to sync to the Accu-chek Connect app on a smartphone for more advanced functions!):

Accu-Chek Guide meters and all related diabetic testing supplies will be available through the patient's pharmacy with a prescription (either ZSFG outpatient pharmacy or retail pharmacy). The following NDCs will be covered:

Glucometers will no longer be dispensed through the clinics. If your clinic would like to stock glucometers, they can be ordered as floor stock.

NEW OZEMPIC 1 MG PEN

The 1 mg Ozempic pen used to come as a 1.5 mL/2 mg pen for 2 doses, thus a monthly supply was written as 3 mL/2 pens. **Novo Nordisk has now changed the 1 mg dose to a single 4 mg/3 mL pen.** We've added the new Ozempic 1 mg pen in Epic. Please inform your patients of the change.

There has been no change to the 0.25-0.5 mg Ozempic pen for the lower doses.

FORMULARY COVERAGE FOR SGLT-2 INHIBITORS & GLP-1 AGONISTS

With additional indications for ASCVD, HFrEF, CKD and nephropathy benefit, we know that SGLT-2 inhibitors and GLP-1 agonists are increasingly being used in primary care care as well as in diabetes/renal/cardiology. Figuring out what you can get is always the peskier question.

Formularies are ever changing, but as of now, this is our latest cheatsheet on which
